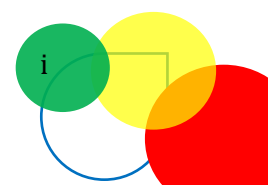

GETTING CLOSER TO THE FACULTY OF SOCIAL SCIENCES

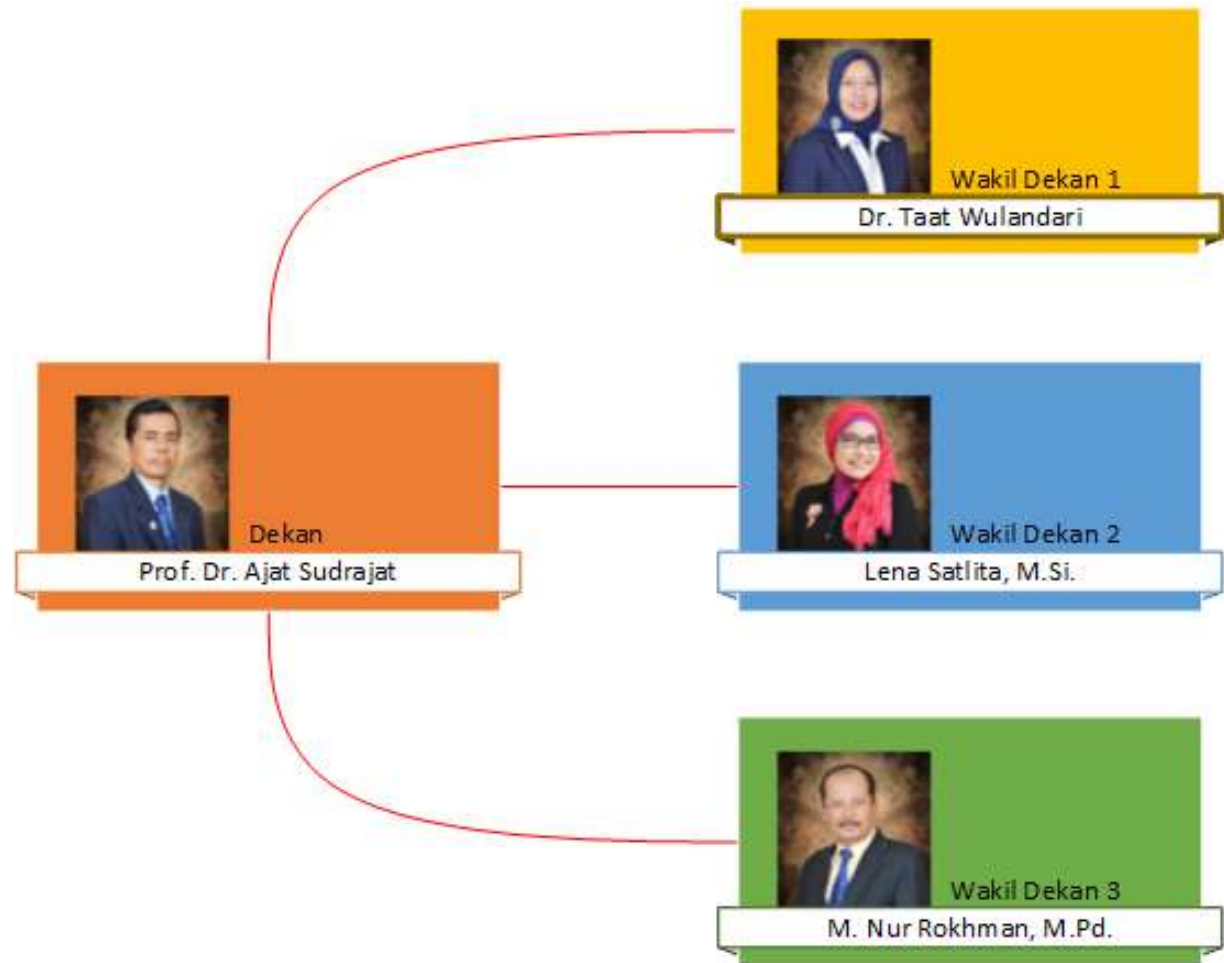
The Faculty of Social Sciences is one of the seven faculties at Universitas Negeri Yogyakarta (UNY). The Faculty of Social Sciences is well known as the faculty of movement which offers alternatives to Indonesian-based social thinking. The establishment of this Faculty cannot be separated from the history of the establishment of Yogyakarta State University (formerly Institute of Teacher Training and Education) as one of the teacher's college (LPTK). The Faculty of Social Sciences YSU formerly was the Faculty of Social Knowledge Teacher Training (FKPS) which later changed its name to the Faculty of Social Sciences Teacher Training (FKIS), then it changed to the Faculty of Social Sciences Education (FKIPS), it changed again to the Faculty of Social Sciences (FIS), it developed into the Faculty of Social and Sciences and Economics (FISE) and now it is known as the Faculty of Social Sciences (FIS).

The Faculty of Social Sciences has set the goal to produce educators and researchers /scientists in which to achieve this goal, educational and non-educational study programs are developed. Study programs at the Faculty of Social Sciences include Civic and Law Education Study Programs; Geography Education Study Program; History Education Study Program; Sociology Education Study Program; Social Sciences Education Study Program; History Science Study Program; Communication Science Study Program; and the Public Administration Study Program.

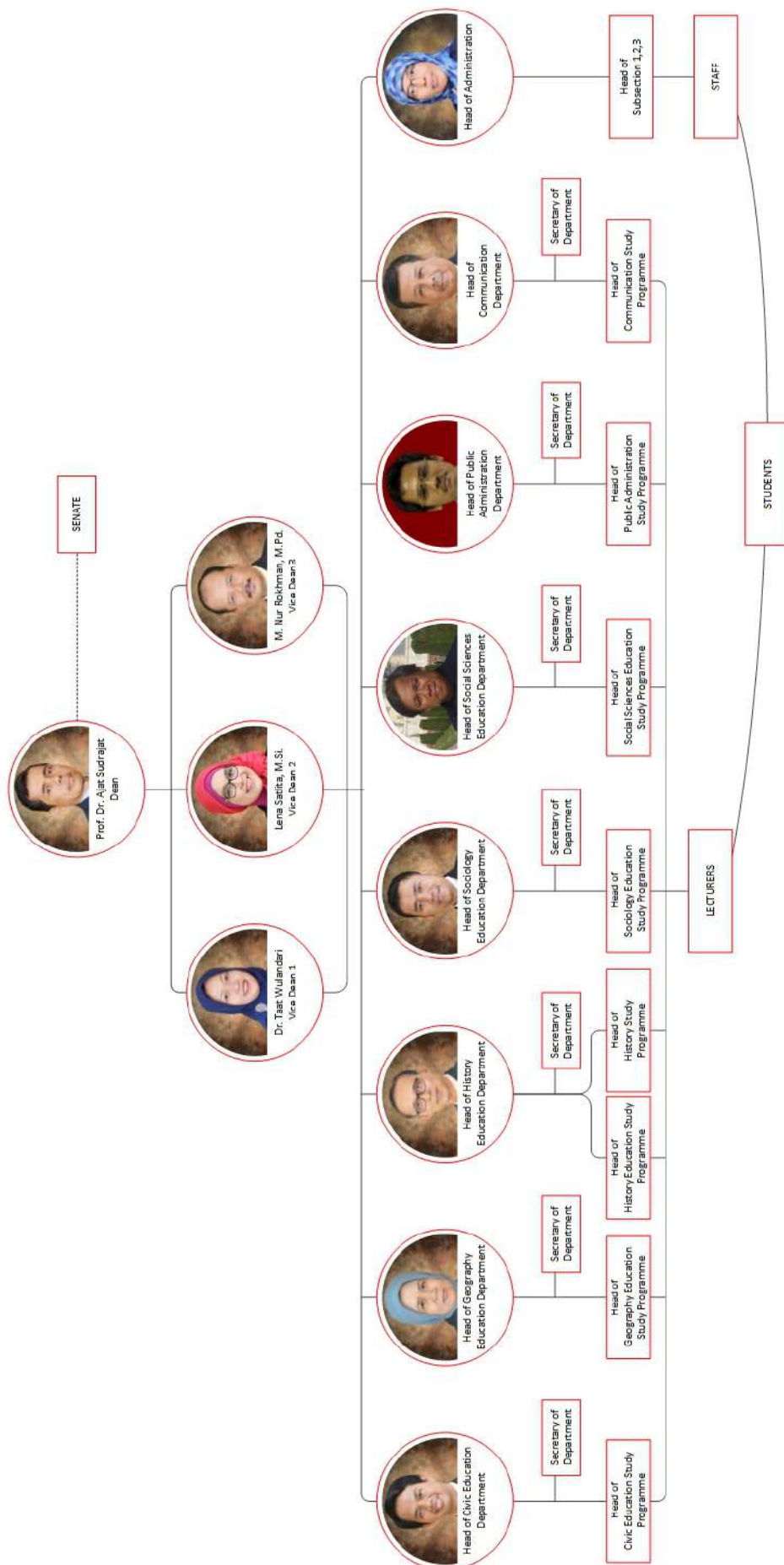

The Faculty of Social Sciences aims to produce professional educators and scientists in the field of social science education and social sciences in general. Graduates have pre-eminence in mastering transformative social sciences and are able to meet the demands of the workplace. This faculty is a pioneer in the development of integrated social sciences that produces social science teachers who are able to teach social sciences at Junior High Schools employing an integrated approach. In addition, The Faculty of Social Sciences promotes the development of character education courses independently.

The Faculty of Social Sciences which promotes a research university directs its research and services under the theme of: 1) Indonesian-based social sciences, 2) Professional education, 3) Indigenization of Social Sciences as a Core Business, 4) Domestic and foreign social science networks, and 5) Scientific innovation within the spirit of Indigenization. The Faculty of Social Sciences develops Indonesian studies through the Indonesian Social Sciences Study Council (MASISKA) which carries out: Indonesian-based Research, Indonesian-based Seminar, Indonesian-based Learning: curriculum, syllabus, textbooks. FACILITIES

The Faculty of Social Sciences provides facilities that support the development of academic and non-academic fields for the entire academic community. The facilities are classified into physical and non-physical categories.

- Comfortable classrooms

The Faculty of Social Sciences provides classrooms for lecturing activities which are located in the east part of the faculty. Each classroom is 7x10 m and has a capacity of 50 seats. Also, they are equipped with supporting learning facilities such as LCD, Computers, Wifi Networks, Audio Speakers, and AC.

- Indoor laboratories for various activities

To support student academic activities, the Faculty of Social Sciences provides an integrated indoor laboratory building, in which there are laboratories for each department in it. This laboratory building includes Computer laboratory of Fisnet, micro-teaching laboratory, Public Administration Laboratory, Geography education Laboratory, History Science laboratory, History Education Laboratory, Sociology Education Laboratory, and Civic and Law Laboratory.

- Outdoor laboratories for field practice

In addition to the indoor laboratory located in the Faculty of Social Sciences complex, an outdoor laboratory of social sciences education located in Boko, Prambanan, Sleman, Yogyakarta is provided for field practice. This laboratory is used by students to apply the theory they have learned in the society.

- Seminar rooms

Two types of seminar room are available for lecturers and students namely a large seminar room with a capacity of 200 seats, and a small seminar room with a capacity of 80 seats.

- Thesis defense rooms

There are two thesis defense rooms at the Faculty of Social Sciences which are located in the 2nd floor of the north building

- Prayer Room

- Library

The Library of the Faculty of Social Sciences is located in the Dean Building on the 1st floor. The Library offers a circulation service and houses hundreds of book collections and journals that can be utilized by students as learning resources.

- Student Centers

The Student Center Building (PKM) is located in the east part of the Faculty of Social Sciences which can be used by the students to develop their organizational and leadership skills. This building is equipped with an administration room, meeting / discussion room, wifi network, and association room such as the department student association and UKMF (Faculty Student Activity Unit).

- Gazebo / co-working space

Gazebos are built in several corners of the Faculty of Social Sciences which can be used by students to discuss, do assignments, organize activities, and perform other academic activities. Gazebos are equipped with electricity and wifi network for students.

- **Canteen and Cooperatives**
The canteen building is located in the eastern area of the faculty, precisely at the same area as the PKM Building. The canteen is designed like a mini food court offering various types of food which is affordable for students
- **Parking lots**
The Faculty of Social Sciences has three parking areas including east parking lot, west parking area, and the Pancasila park with a capacity of 800 motorcycles and 40 cars.
- **Free Drinking Water Refill**
In order to support the environmentally friendly movement and implement Kemenristekdikti's mandate not to use bottled water, the Faculty of Social Sciences provides a free drinking water refill dispenser in the east building. Students can use it to refill their drinking bottles.

- E-Library (FISNET)

E-library at the Faculty of Social Sciences Yogyakarta State University has been operating to serve the needs of lecturers and students to get access to literature sources. PCs are provided to increase the access to the E-library of both faculty and university. The capacity of international internet connections used at YSU including Fisnet is 1.05 GBps. In addition, LAN access in the campus area via wireless has been available through wifi hotspot in 43 strategic points in which the coverage area reaches 100% of the campus area. Moreover, there are three wifi spots in the Faculty of Social Sciences which cover academic services and lecture buildings.

- Internet Networks

All civitas academic at the Faculty of Social Sciences get free internet access that can be reached within the campus complex. They can access the internet by logging in via their respective email accounts on the SSO (Single Sign On) page at <http://sso.uny.ac.id> and Eduroam.

➤ Registration procedures

The admission of new students in the Faculty of Social Sciences is carried out every year through several enrollment models. The whole process of new student enrollment is carried out online on the page www.pmb.uny.ac.id which can be accessed by prospective students anywhere and anytime. The content of the webpage helps ease prospective students to get information related to lectures. STUDYING AT THE FACULTY OF SOCIAL SCIENCES

PLANNING A STUDY

New students who have been accepted in one of the study programs at the Faculty of Social Sciences will be guided by an academic advisor in planning and conducting studies. During the study, the academic advisor will provide assistance and evaluation of the study. Based on the curriculum of the study programs at the Faculty of Social Sciences, students must take a total of 144-150 credit points in order to complete their studies and obtain a bachelor's degree. The credit points can be completed for eight semesters with a maximum time limit of 12 semesters. Planning to take credit points each semester is guided by an academic advisor.

Completing the form of study plan is carried out by students online. However, before filling the forms, students must ask for suggestions and approval from their academic advisors. Academic advisors will give online approval of the credits plan that will be taken by students by considering the GPA of the previous semester. For a new student, academic advisors will give approval to take all courses offered in the first semester. If students want to cancel certain courses that have been taken, they should get approval from the academic advisor no later than the 8th week from the start of lecture activities. Also, students can add one course no later than the 3rd week from the start of the lecture provided that it does not exceed the maximum credits allowed in one semester.

The form of study plan becomes the basis for allowing students to attend the lectures. Students are permitted and deserve to take lectures and examinations if the courses are listed in the form of study plan which exists in the academic information system (<https://siakad2013.uny.ac.id>). The meetings between students and academic advisors to discuss study plans are often referred to as student's consultation activities.

LEARNING METHODS

The lectures are conducted based on a semester credit system. There are three types of semester at Yogyakarta State University, namely odd semester, even semester, and in-between-semester. An odd semester is from September to January of the following year. An even semester is from February to August in the same year. In-between-semester is from July to August in the same year. The lecture activities for one semester consists of 16 meetings, excluding the final semester exams.

Beside face-to-face lectures in the classroom, the Faculty of Social Sciences also organizes blended learning and full e-learning models. Blended learning is performed by combining face-to-face learning with online learning. In a blended learning model, learning is alternately carried out between face-to-face lectures in the classroom and online learning. Meanwhile, the full e-learning is a learning model whose entire learning process is performed online. In this case, online learning activities are carried out through <http://besmart.uny.ac.id/v2/>, which contains various online courses offered by all study programs at the faculty of social sciences.

In the teaching and learning process, the lecturers will fill in online lecture attendance records for 16



meetings. Students must attend lectures at least 75% in one semester. Students who are absent during the lectures due to sick or other logical reasons are recorded as present. If the students do not meet 75% attendance, they do not deserve to take the final exam and

get E. Moreover, the students are required to fill out an evaluation sheet of the lectures.

The lectures carried out at the Faculty of Social Sciences cover theory, field practice, and practicum. The time allocation for each lecture on theory, field practice, and practicum varies referring to the academic regulations at Yogyakarta State University. Lectures are conducted by employing a variety of methods that encourage students to actively involve in the learning

activities. Practicum activities are conducted in the Social Science Integrated Laboratory building, FISNET laboratory, Geospatial Laboratory, Microteaching Laboratory. The activities include: Geographic Information System analysis, Remote Sensing, Mapping, Statistics, and broadcast media production practices. Practical activities are also supported by outdoor activities such as in the measurement of Meteorology-Climatology, Geology, Geomorphology, Soil, and Hydrology. For the educational study program, teaching practices are conducted in the microteaching laboratory. This teaching practice is carried out before the students conduct the field teaching practice at school. In addition, learning innovations continue to be carried out in the faculty of social sciences, such as developing game-based learning and learning media that encourage student activities.

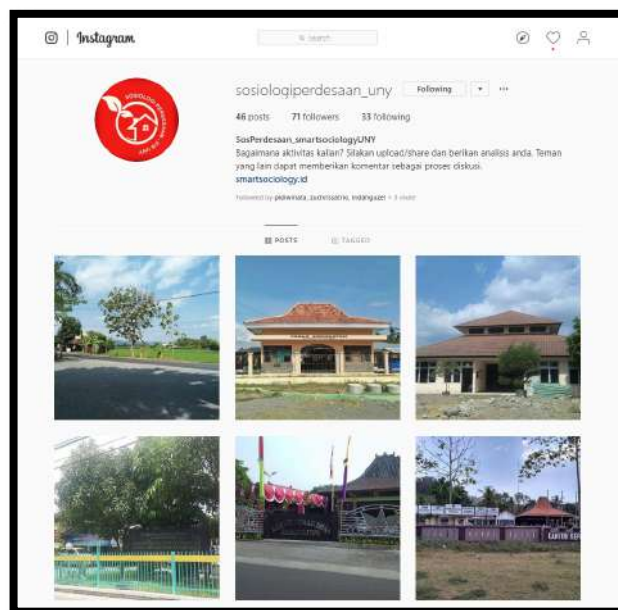

1. Games of online quizzes utilizing applications in the gadgets to increase student participation.



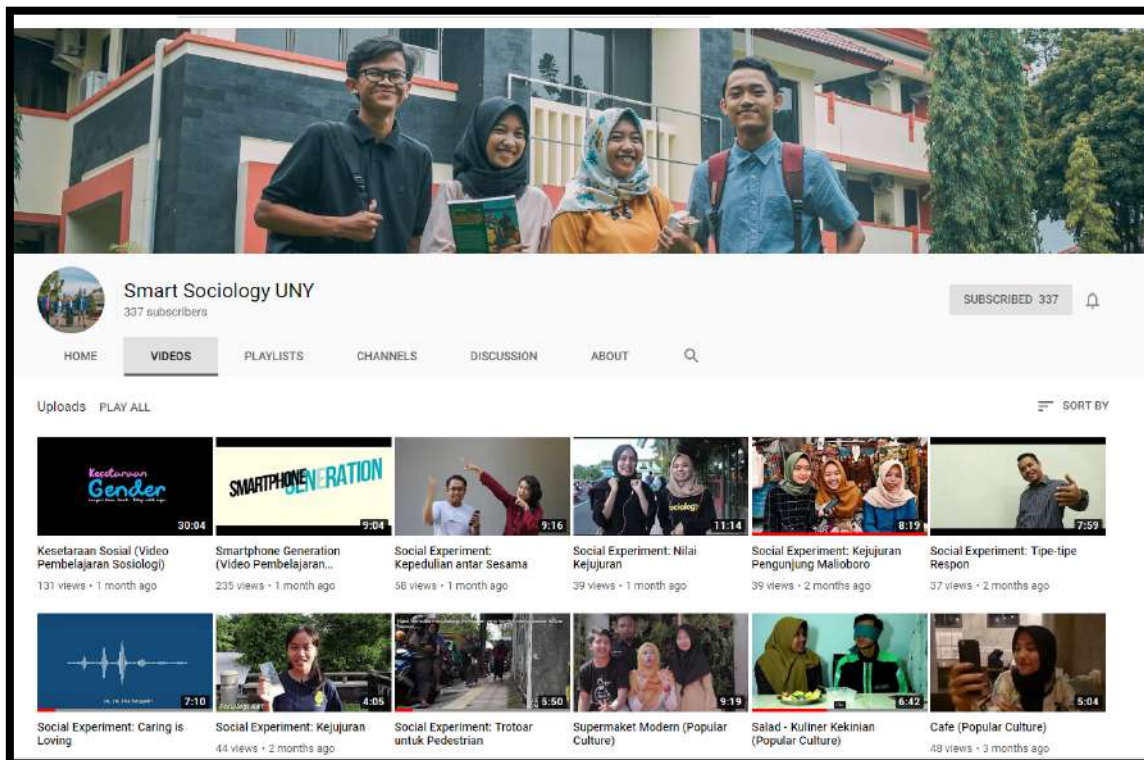
2. An instagram to develop student's creativity and share their understanding on the community studies

ASSESSMENT AND EVALUATION CRITERIA

The evaluation of the study is carried out by taking into account various aspects including knowledge, skills, and attitudes / characters that reflect student competencies. In evaluating, various approaches are used based on the competencies required by students. Final scores obtained by students reflect their competencies in all aspects namely a participation in lectures, an assignment / report completion, and a test score.

Basically, the assessment method is adjusted to the desired learning outcome of each subject. In some study programs, some courses enhance attitudes, knowledge, general skills, and special skills. Each course has a different assessment method. To conduct an attitude assessment, the lecturers observe student's activities in the classroom using the grading rubric. Meanwhile, to assess the mastery of knowledge and skills in each

subject, a variety of methods are used including oral tests, performance, assignments, portfolios, and written tests with established assessment standards. The final score obtained is in numbers ranging from zero to 100. Then, the scores are converted into letters between A to E in accordance with rules stipulated in academic regulations at YSU. The score of each course is then used to calculate the GPA which becomes one of the graduation criteria. The assessment standards are presented in the following table.

There are several aspects which are required for graduation, including the number of credits taken, minimum of GPA, and ProTEFL scores. For undergraduate programs, in order to meet the graduation requirements, students must take 144 credits with a minimum GPA of 2.50 and a ProTEFL score of 425. In addition, there are additional requirements namely the students may get a maximum of 10% for D score and do not get E score. The ProTEFL test in question is a test of English proficiency that is organized by the YSU language training center and has a score equivalent to other tests. Students who have met the graduation requirements can graduate with different predicate such as summa cumlaude, cumlaude, very satisfactory, or satisfactory.

STUDY EVALUATION

There are two stages of study evaluation which are conducted to determine student learning outcomes. The first stage of evaluation is carried out to identify various obstacles in the learning process. This stage is intended to design a more planned, structured, and systemic learning process. The evaluation results are given to students, academic advisors, and students' parents. The second stage of evaluation is conducted to determine whether students can continue their studies or not. If a student is unable to complete his study, he is declared resigned and is given a letter stating that they have once taken a study.

The first stage of evaluation for the bachelor program is carried out in the first three semesters, and the second stage is conducted in the next three semesters. The study progress in the third semester is that the students have taken at least 30 credits of courses without D and E grades and a GPA of 2.50. Meanwhile, the study progress in the sixth semester is that the students have taken a minimum of 60 credits of courses without grades D and E with a minimum GPA of 2.50.

GRADUATION

Students who have completed the courses and met the graduation requirements are declared to have graduated from the faculty of social sciences and deserved a bachelor's degree in accordance with their field of study. Graduation requirements set by YSU for undergraduate programs are completing 144 credit credits, getting a minimum GPA of 2.50, obtaining a ProTEFL score of 425, getting a maximum D value of 10%, and having no E mark.

Students who have attended the lectures and met the graduation requirements may take part in the Judicium as a form of graduation ceremony. In this stage, students must follow the entire process. Judicium is held every month in which time is set by the Faculty of Social Sciences. Students who cannot take part in the Judicium in the given month may participate in the following month. Judicium as a form of student graduation is stated in a Decree of the Dean of the Faculty of Social Sciences. The graduation date is set as the date of Judicium. The last stage in the graduation process is a graduation ceremony. Graduation ceremonies are held based on the academic calendar. In the graduation ceremony, each graduate receives an original diploma and a diploma supplement.
